At 'Planning Aid,' we provide free, independent and professional advice and support on town planning matters. The advice provided clearly reflects the current UK planning system, but is not part of local or central government nor developer influenced – and can therefore be truly impartial.

Who Is It for?

Planning Aid is for individuals, community groups and organisations who cannot afford to pay fees to a planning consultant. We work with communities all over London on a variety of planning, housing, transport and environmental issues. Our advice and support help people to:

- Understand and interact with the planning system
- Take part in preparing policy plans
- Put together their own plans for their communities
- Make comments on planning applications
- Apply for planning permission
- Appeal against a refusal of permission
- Appear with confidence at planning committees and public inquiries

How Can I Get Free Advice?

Call our designated helpline and we will take the relevant details of the case and your contact details. You will also be asked for details of your circumstances to ensure that you qualify for this free service. Once we have this information, we pass your contact and case details to one of our many qualified caseworkers who will contact you either by phone, in writing or in person by appointment – depending on the circumstances.
